After moving to California in the late seventies to attend college, Al was inspired to switch from plugs to the fly rod. Here he began his fly

fishing journey after years of reading articles written by saltwater fly fishing luminaries such as Joe Brooks, Lefty Kreh, Frank Woolner, Bob Popovics, Lou Tabory and our own Nick Curcione.

Al lectures and presents programs to many fly fishing clubs and fly shops in southern California. He founded the "One Surf Fly," an event which he created to help promote his favorite sport along the SoCal coast. Al also created the "Double Haul Ball," which is a free, educational and collaborative effort put

forth by local fly fishing friends and Federation of Fly Fishers certified casters and is held once a year at the historic Long Beach Casting Club. Al and good friend Conway Bowman (of "Bowman Bluewater" and "Fly Fishing the World" fame) both host the Carp Throwdown at Lake Henshaw, San Diego each June. This Orvis sponsored event is mainly a sight-fishing tourna-

ment for carp-enthusiasts and has been widely recognized across the country. The tournament is timed around the hopper hatch so anglers can experience dry fly sight-fishing for cruising carp.

Al's articles and fly patterns have been published in Fly Fishing in Saltwaters, Fly Tyer, California Fly Fisher and Saltwater Fly Fishing magazines. He is currently on the pro tying staffs for Umpqua, Tuffleye and Enrico Puglisi. His Beach Bug pattern is one of the best selling SoCal surf flies in Umpqua's Surf Fly Series. Al's other commercial Umpqua patterns include Qs Corbina Candy, Qs Thin Lizzie and the Qs Ghost Whisper.








Fisher member) Jim Solomon created to help anglers learn to be better fly casters.

San Fernando Valley Club takes on the mighty Bighorn. **By Smoother Smythe**

A Trip to the Bighorn River.

was kindly elected to write the article for the Fly Paper but feel that I can only give you an overview from my perspective and that of my fish fanatic partner Colleen. I feel that our fishing experiences were very much mirrored by the whole group.

It was December 20 2016 when I sent an email to Colleen telling her that I was going to book a week of fly fishing on the Bighorn River in Montana for the two of us. She had previously mentioned to me that, judging from the comments of other club members, it was something she thought we would enjoy. She was dead right.

If you attend the monthly club meetings you will know this to be the trip that Jack Jonathon strongly promotes each year. Our out of state club member Paul Guttenberg puts this together from his home in Colorado Springs and a fine job he did this year.

I was quite surprised when the list of participants arrived by email listing twenty four of us. That meant we would be needing 12 guides and 12 boats. I figured the boat ramp was going to look like the Dunkirk beaches. Our group comprised 16 members from SPFF with the balance from either Pasadena Casting Club or those free of any club affiliations. We all arrived on Sunday May 20th with departures booked for Saturday May 27th.

Paul had worked up a grid listing who everyone's fishing partner would be on each of the five days. He also worked up a grid listing the guide that would be taking care of those anglers on each specific day. It was a terrific idea as it meant that each angler fished with five

different guides during the week... each guide with his own style and approach to the fishing conditions.

The fishing conditions. The normal flows for late May are around 4,000 cfs. We were about to fish the river flowing at 13,000 cfs with wading out of the question. Needless to say I felt it was going to be a bit of a blow out and I would be hear-

ing "you should have been here last year". Win some lose some kind of thing.. Oh well, nothing ventured nothing gained.

Monday morning 8am with light winds and pleasant temperatures. Meet George Young our guide de jour. George had us employ a conventional two fly nymphing rig with plenty of weight above the flies. Magic, we were immediately into fish. 14" was average with a few getting up to 17" plus.

Tuesday. Sunshine and no wind. Meet Mike Faris.

Mike says we need to take advantage of the weather conditions and go upriver to the lake above the main dam. We will be fishing for carp (huh!!). With the sunshine

and no wind we were able to have a day of sight fishing with medium size dry flies. End result, Smoother 7 and Colleen 9. This was an absolute hoot.

Wednesday. Meet Ray McCarn. Weather was mild with light wind. Ray had us using the Teton method of

> nymphing. This entails bouncing a weight along the river bottom which is very effective in high water and legal on the Big-

Another great day with the local grand slam Rainbow, Brown, Whitefish and Sucker.

Thursday. Extremely high winds and very cold. Meet Sam Mayrakis. Sam.

I was keen to try out my Hornberg and streamer fish the bank. The boat and current moved so fast that large fish were leaping

This year's two recipients were among the top applicants that we have had since initiating the award in 2005.

Both Paige Kauffman, a Saugus High School senior and Mireille Vargas, a senior from Santa Paula High School, BOTH had GPA's above 4.5 and had received all A's or Apluss grades throughout high school while taking mostly AP and Honors classes.

Paige will be attending the University of California San Diego and majoring in Marine Biology. She was number one in her class of 548 students. Paige has always been interested in science and the outdoors, coming from a nature orientated

family and has been involved in camping, hiking, surfing, kayaking and snorkeling.

A FOND FAREWELL

George Robert "Bob" Thille, 1939 to 2017, finally lost his battle with an aggressive form of Squamous Cell cancer of the neck, lungs and elsewhere.

Life was idyllic for a young boy growing up in the San Fernando Valley region of Los Angeles in the 1940's and 1950's. Bob had lots of neighborhood kids to play with outside the family's home in Sherman Oaks. Saturday morning was the perfect time to take the 10-cent streetcar rides down Ventura Blvd. to the movies. There was a newsreel, cartoons, and a double feature. Trips to the beach in Santa Monica and the snow in the winter in the local mountains were enjoyed by parents Nick and Georgette and later on by sisters Nancy and Pat.

Bob's father was a skilled carpenter and a building inspector for Los Angeles. He not only built the Sherman Oaks home, but also constructed two more, one in Tarzana and the other in later years in Agoura. Georgie was a housewife and elementary school teacher.

At age 13 Bob was given a .22 rifle that served as his constant companion while roaming around the Santa Monica Mountains near his home in Tarzana. Pal, Gary Hoffman, invited Bob on weekend fishing trips to Catalina Island aboard his family's 34-foot cabin cruiser. A seed was planted in childhood that became life long passions: fishing and exploring the world. He's been to all seven continents and over 85 countries.

Bob progressed through school, ending up with a degree in geography at California State University at Northridge and a teaching credential. He started teaching 6th grade in 1965 at Woodlake Elementary .The 1969-70 school year was spent in Toronto, Canada on a Fulbright Teaching Exchange. He volunteered for two years teaching at Normandy Elementary in Watts. In 1975-76 the family was in Southern England on another Fulbright exchange. In 1980 he started the 1st of three ½ year Sabbaticals. He joined an Overland expedition driving and camping for 112 days from London to Johannesburg, South Africa. He returned to teach at Canoga Park Elementary School. In 1982 sons Todd and Brian were taken out of elementary school to trailer camp around most of Mexico for almost 6 months on a 2nd sabbatical. Upon return Bob made the move to Hale Middle School where he taught 7th grade World History and Geography. He started the school's Science Fair and ran the Nat'l Geographic Geography Bee. In 1990 the 3rd ½ semester sabbatical was granted and then 19-year-old son Todd took a semester off from Pierce Jr. College to join his father on a 6 month around the world trip. Bob retired in 2000.

Fifty years ago, Bob married Carol Haines and over the years added two sons to the busy household, Todd Nicholas and Brian Lee. Schoolwork, endless projects, outings, Boy Scouts, and prolonged trips were in order.

Todd and Duygu live in Istanbul, Turkey with their twin (9 month old) daughters, Gaia and Luna. He is a web designer and works at home.

Brian and Catherine reside near Atlanta, Georgia with daughters Maya (14) and Elana (12). Brian works in marketing.

Bob is known for his encyclopedia knowledge of travel destinations and restaurants. He thinks nothing of planning a three or four month trip, arranging the details for each day: mode of transportation, hotel, sights to be seen, mileage, etc. All is in place before starting out. Bob has seen the world from Antarctica to the Arctic and points in between. Besides enjoying foreign travel, he and Carol have crisscrossed all fifty states countless times plus much of Canada and Mexico pulling their house trailer behind.

Over the years he's enjoyed membership in Southern California Overseas Teachers, the Desert Explorers 4X4 group, 25 years in the Sierra Pacific Flyfishers, The Los Angeles Cactus and Succulent Society and Neighborhood Watch.

Bob is off at his favorite fishing spot, so no service will take place.



Fish Reports

Hot Creek - Local Weather and Flows

Water Conditions: Fair

Flows at 344CFS as of 6/23

Runoff is affecting water clarity, and probably will for the next several weeks.

(Note flows include water from the springs, not just the gauging station at the highway so this is what is really flowing through the canyon)

Fishing conditions and Hatches:Fair

Runoff is going stronger than ever. Getting reports of a few quality fish here and there. FIsh the seams where the water is moving even just a little bit slower with the biggest and brightest you've got in your box. Swinging a big streamer couldn't hurt either.

Recommended Flies:

DRIES:Nope

NYMPHS: San Juan Worm Red #14, Western Coachman #14, Prince Nymph #14, Red Copper John #14, Nitro Caddis #14

STREAMERS: Conehead double bunny white/olive. Dirty Hippy Rainbow, Slump Busters

Guides Hint:

UPPER OWENS RIVER- Local Weather and Flows

Water Conditions:Fair

Flows are at 177cfs as of 6/23 Above the confluence

Things are starting to dry up finally, but there are still some pockets of standing water. Be careful if you don't have 4WD.

Water is off color above the confluence, and dirty below.

Fishing Conditions and Hatches: Fair

The cutthroat havereturned to the lake. but you can catch smaller resident fish here and there on some small caddis dries up high at long ears where the water is clearer and the flows are lower. NYMPHS: #12-16 Bead Head Prince Hot creek is flowing well over 300cfs right now, so stay above the confluence.

Recommended Flies:

DRIES: Little elk hair caddis.

Nymph, #16-18 Pheasant Tail, Flashback Hares Ear #14-16, Red Copper John #12-14, Western Coachmen #12-16, San Juan Worms #12, Egg patterns any size, Zebra Midge #18. Copper Tiger Midge, Maribou leeches

STREAMERS: Double Bunny, Ruby Eye Leech, Goat Leech, Maribou Leech.
