BAJA ADVENTURES with Gary Bulla

In February we welcome back Gary Bulla, with an updated program on the exciting fishing to be found in Southern Baja. Gary is a familiar figure on the local saltwater scene and brings an infectious

enthusiasm to his presentations. Get ready to pack your bags for Mexico!

Gary Bulla's presentation will take anglers through the fishing season on the Sea of Cortez in Southern Baja. At five million years old this inland sea is the youngest in the world; yet biologically it is the richest body of water on our planet. The diversity of fish in Baja waters means anglers can revisit Baja at various times of the year and have very different quarry. There is surface sight fishing and deeper water fishing at all times of the year. Panga fishing from outboard skiffs modified for flyfishing can



produce rod bending, spool burning takes that test your endurance and your knot tying.

Casting to rooster fish or dorado on the surface is a sport sure to provide a large dose of adrenalin. There is no other fishing that is comparable to flyfishing for roosters. It is sight fishing taken to the extreme. Because of the incredible surface action that causes sheer panic and adrenalin spikes and their completely unpredictable



movements and moods, it is considered by many to be the most dynamic flyfishing on the planet. But, what makes this part of Baja's Sea of Cortez so special?

The Punta Arenas/Cerralvo Island area is unique. All world records for Roosterfish were recorded here. The bait populations here are abundant and support a huge population of both pelagic and reef dwellers. Coral reefs flourish adjacent to incredibly deep trenches, combined with the seasonal winds enhanced by the channel, they create the constant upwellings of plankton and other nutrients that provide the foundation for an astounding diversity of species.

Not only do over 900 species of fish thrive here, but sea turtles, sea lions, whales, orcas, huge schools of manta rays and dolphins are residents during many months of the year. Jacques Cousteau spent so much time exploring the richness of the area that the Mexican Government officially changed the name of Cerralvo Island to Jacques

Cousteau Island. He called it "The world's aquarium".

For fly fishers, the large bays, points, and the island mean that there is usually shelter from open sea winds and swells when present. Pangas, or small open boats, can be utilized effectively. They are stealthier and more maneuverable than large sport fishing boats. Two anglers can fish at once and cast in most any direction when necessary. Roosterfish cruise the inshore within a few hundred feet of the beach for food as small as the flat iron herring, or "sardina", and as large as ladyfish. Yellowfin tuna and dorado can be caught close to shore also. You don't have to run miles to offshore banks to find them.



Gary will share his discoveries with the club, including tackle and techniques for the dazzling variety of fish south of the border.

Gary's thirty-three-year relationship with the captains in the Cerralvo Island/Punta Arenas area of Baja has led to a transformation in the values of the fishing community. They have become the best and most sought after flyfishing captains in the area and converts to the values of protecting their fishery and encouraging catch and release.

Gary's journey began as a young man. He grew up on the beaches of the Southern California Coast where father took him camping and fishing once a month and his mother was an avid saltwater fisher. As a member of the Newport Lady Anglers she even took trips to Baja to fish in the 1960's, where she caught sailfish, dorado and marlin.

Gary's wife, Theresa, was an innovative teacher whose specialty is marine biology. In the eighties they both met Yvon and Malinda Chouinard because they were impressed with Theresa's teaching methodologies. They invited them to their Wyoming home where Yvon taught Gary how to cast a fly rod on the Snake River. Yvon and Gary returned to Ventura and flyfished in the surf for perch. The seed was planted. Gary discovered salt-water fly fishing combined his long-time love for the ocean and his passion for fly fishing with the convenience of having fish right at his back door



He quickly realized that there was not a great deal of information about catching West coast salt-water species on the fly and began to use his knowledge of tides and tidal life to not only chase down surf perch, but corbina, halibut, yellowfin croaker, striped bass and white sea bass. There were untapped fly-fishing opportunities right along the shores of Southern California that would provide opportunity and awesome challenges for the fly fishers of the area. California corbina were the most interesting challenge. They were visible in the surf line-and difficult to fool. Perfect!

Over the next few years, he spent his early mornings and late evenings patrolling the beaches, trying to develop presentations and flies that could lure the corbina. He began guiding others and holding seminars on surf fishing. Through his website and a small community of hard-core surf fishers, the information on fly fishing the surf exploded, and so did the number of fly fishers walking the beaches. Gary also began exploring the kelp beds in his kayak, and developing flies that would attract the many varieties of fish found on the Southern California Coast.

In 1989, Gary began accompanying Theresa on expeditions to Baja's southernmost bay where gray whales migrate to give birth to their young. Camping and kayaking with her students on Baja's Magdalena Island they discovered adjacent estuaries abundant with species of birds and fish. He brought a fly rod and was astounded at the incredible variety of fish that were available in the waters of Baja. After the trips with the students, he explored other waters of Southern Baja. In 1990 he met members of the Lucero family at Punta Arenas and introduced them to the first fly rods they had ever seen. Their relationship quickly deepened as the Luceros shared their deep knowledge of the Gulf of California. Together, they developed successful flies and methods of fly fishing. Over the years his clients became friends with his staff and captains and were more numerous every season.

He now spends spring, summer and fall hosting and guiding all-inclusive fly-fishing trips at Punta Arena/Cerralvo Island (in the Sea of Cortez) and other international destinations. He has guided kayak fly fishing trips to Magdalena Island and Espiritu Santo Island and hosted multiple trips to Belize and the Amazon.

A keen photographer, his photos have appeared in The Drake Magazine, Fly Rod and Reel, The Patagonia Catalog, Pacific Sportfisher and more. Southwest Flyfishing Magazine published his feature article on "Flyfishing the Santa Barbara Surf" in their January/February 2106 issue. Currently Pacific Sportsman Magazine Jan/Feb 2023 featured him in an article "Combing for Baja Roosters" by Glenn Ueda.

Gary's "Gremmie" surf fly was featured in a Scott Sadil article in <u>California Flyfisher Magazine</u>, and has become a "go-to" for surf fishing in California. His Papagallo and Tuna Tux series are standards in the waters of Baja and were featured in Tony



Lolli's book "Go-to Flies". He is featured in the upcoming film "Bitter Waters", by Peter Grigsby and New Sky Productions.

Gary held the IGFA 16-pound tippet world record for California yellowtail at 34.7 pounds and the 20-pound tippet world record 32.5 pounds. When he is not working the salt, he is at his home and in his custom furniture studio in Ojai, California.

John is a recipient of the ITFF Bus Buszek Memorial Award (as is our own Steve Fernandez), having tied flies for more than 50 years, teaching and tying and fishing all over the country. His fly plates, and especially his salmon flies, are highly prized and collected. He's a casting instructor, rod builder, writer and artist, and we've been lucky enough to have him teach our fly tying group on occasion. It was our honor to present him with this award.

The second award was a new one which I instituted as my last official act as President of SPFF. It is the Michael Peratis Education Award, to be presented to honorees who have given their time, expertise and example as teachers in the many aspects of fly fishing. The Inaugural award was presented, appropriately, to none other than Michael Peratis. There could be no more deserving honoree; I don't know how the club could have survived the past few years without him.
