### CONSERVATION REPORT: CALTROUT SO CAL INITIATIVE

California Trout (CalTrout) is the 48-year-old conservation organization whose mission is "Ensuring resilient wild fish in healthy waters for a better California". They are probably best known for their science-based projects on behalf of trout, steelhead and salmon in northern California waters, such as Hat Creek, the McCloud, Klamath, Fall and Eel rivers, and trout in Hot Creek and the Owens River in the eastern Sierra. CalTrout also has significant steelhead recovery projects in Los Angeles, Ventura and Orange As the leader of the South Coast Steelhead counties. Coalition CalTrout is doing habitat restoration, fish passage projects and invasive species removal on the Santa Clara River watershed and, farther south, Trabuco Creek, CalTrout also continues to have a leadership role in the long-running Matilija and Rindge dam removal projects, which are projected to see completion in 8 to 12 years. These are just a few of the many projects and initiatives that CalTrout is engaged in.

Of special note for us here in the southland, CalTrout has added a southern California initiative to its 2019 strategic plan. One goal of this initiative is to protect and enhance the wild trout populations of our local streams, several of which harbor resident fish with steelhead ancestry, such as in the tributaries of the San Gabriel River. In the parlance of steelhead restoration science these are called Core 1 streams because they are repositories of potential steelhead genetic stock. This would be in line with the first of CalTrout's five guiding initiatives, to "Protect the Best". (The others are Integrate Wild Fish and Working Landscapes, Reconnect Habitat, Steward Source Water Areas, and Restore Estuaries"). CalTrout is also invested in enlarging its membership in southern California, and in recruiting additional board members from the southland who can represent our interests.

As a first step in this engagement CalTrout has established the Southern California Advisory Council. Headed by southern California board member Mr. Ed De La Rosa, the Council includes representatives from several of our local fly fishing clubs, the Southwest Council of the IFF, and other local CalTrout supporters. Members act as ambassadors to the local fishing clubs and other organizations to garner support and to gather ideas for potential southern California trout conservation projects. # CONSERVATION REPORT: NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT ACT

On February 26, the U.S. House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed the Natural Resources Management Act. Previously passed in the Senate by a vote of 92-8, the Act now awaits President Trump's signature.

The NRMA is an amalgam of more than 100 public lands, natural resources, and water protections bills, all combined into one massive bill of more than 650 pages in length.

Perhaps the most important part of the NRMA is the permanent reauthorization of the Land and Water Conservation Fund. Since 1965, the Fund had received nearly \$4 billion in oil and gas leasing royalties which it then used for more than 40,000 conservation and land projects across the country, boosting national parks, forests, wildlife refuges, and recreation areas. The Fund's authorization had expired periodically, most recently in late 2018, but now will be permanently authorized.

The NRMA also includes the Yellowstone Gateway Protection Act, which would bar new mining claims on 30,000 acres of public land just outside of Yellowstone National Park in the Paradise Valley.

In addition, approximately 1.3 million acres of land in California, Oregon, Utah and New Mexico would be designated as wilderness, six new National Parks Service units would be created, some existing national parks would be enlarged (with 40,000 acres of land to be added to Joshua Tree and Death Valley National Parks), and hundreds of miles of rivers, would receive protection from development or damming.

# EQUIPMENT REPORT: IT AIN'T HEAVY, IT'S MY FLY REEL

Manufacturers are now striving to create the lightest possible fly reels. However, there are instances where these are not suitable. Those of you who are getting into Euro nymphing may have encountered a fairly common problem. The "Euro" style rods such as the Redington Hydrogen, Cortland Competition and Echo Shadow 2, mostly 10-11 feet in length, tend to be light in the butt and heavy at the tip. The fishing style (a derivative of high sticking) calls for your arm to be held out and up as if you were waving to a neighbor across the street. Unless your rod is balanced, this can be very tiring.

What is "balanced" you might ask? Place your index finger under the joint where the cork meets the blank with the reel attached and the rod should remain more or less horizontal. If it does not, and falls down at the tip end, your reel is not heavy enough. This leaves you two options: get a larger, heavier reel or try this ingenious fix.

Many of us have leadcore (the dark grey sinking line material designated T-9 thru T-14) lying around, or you can buy it at Fishermen's Spot. You will need about 50-75 feet depending on the rod/reel you are balancing. Make a temporary connection – this could even be Scotch tape – to the end of your fly line and slowly wind on as much leadcore as you need to balance your outfit. Remove the leadcore and then, using a line winder, strip off all the fly line and backing from your reel leaving about a 1- foot tag on the arbor.

Do not attempt this in your living room, especially if you have a cat! Attach the leadcore to the tag with a nail knot and wind on to reel. Then attach your backing with a nail knot and evenly wind it and the fly line. Voila! You now have a heavier, balanced system.

If you don't want to use leadcore, you could wrap fly tier's lead wire directly around the arbor. I have not tried this but I am told that it works. It seems like a hassle but you will appreciate it after a long day holding out a very long rod. It's also good exercise for your winding hand!

## CONSERVATION REPORT: OWENS RIVER CLEAN UP
