ZOOM GENERAL MEETING: THURSDAY, JANUARY 21

MASTERING THE SHORT GAME with Landon Mayer

One of the top guides in the Western United States, Colorado guide Landon Mayer makes a welcome return to the SoCal speaker circuit. His new video-enhanced program will show that the best fish are often closer than you think. Most anglers wade into the fish they are trying to catch, or assume they are on the far side of the river. As the program will show, trophy fish are

often less than a rod's length away. Observation and a stealthy approach are often the key to a successful day.

Landon Mayer's angling success is fueled by an addiction to pursuing large trout with small flies and lightweight fly-fishing equipment. Mayer enthusiastically teaches and demonstrates his techniques and on-river knowledge and has developed innovative strategies for sighting, hooking, and landing selective trout. He shares these tips and secrets in his books and DVD's. Landon's passion for fly-fishing has allowed him to make several

noteworthy contributions to the sport on and off the water. This has included travels to fly-fishing related organizations of the Mid-Atlantic, West, Pacific Northwest, Southwest, and Southern states, as well as teaching through guided trips, fly-fishing classes, presentations, and demonstrations of his unique techniques. Mayer has been guiding in Colorado full time on the South Platte River for the last 22 years, and one full season on the Nak Nek River in AK. He resides with his wife, Michelle, and their four children in Florissant, Colorado.



Landon was born and raised in Colorado Springs where he began his fly fishing career in the 6th grade when his middle school offered fly casting lessons. Throughout his teens, Landon's love of the sport grew when he spent all his free time hanging around local fly shops and watching VHS tapes by Gary Borger and Doug Swisher until the tapes actually wore out! After graduating high school, Landon pursued a career as a full time guide in Colorado, learning from great Colorado anglers such as Ed Engle, Pat Dorsey and fly tyer John Barr. He also spent one year guiding in Alaska on the Naknek River. During this same time, Landon began publishing articles in magazines such as Fly Fisherman, Fly Rod & Reel, High Country Angler, Southwest Fly Fishing and American Angler.

Mayer is a contributing writer for *Fly Fisherman* and *High Country Angler* magazines. His contributions also have been featured in publications such as *Fly Rod and Reel*, *American Angler*, *Southwest Fly Fishing*, Field and Stream, and *Fish and Fly* magazines. As an ambassador in the fly-fishing industry, Mayer represents several lines including Simms Fly Fishing apparel and is a royalty fly designer for Umpqua Feather

Merchants. He is also an advisory team member of Simms, R.L.Winton, Bauer, Scientific Angler, Smith Optics, Fish Pond, Yeti Coolers, Regal Vise, and Casio Pro Trek watches.

Landon's techniques are contained in his best known publications - The Hunt for Giant Trout: 25 Top Locations in the US to Catch a Trophy Trout, Trout Tips: A Guide's Secrets, Tactics and Techniques, Colorado's Best Fly Fishing, Sight Fishing for Trout, and How to Catch the Biggest Trout of Your Life - in addition to three DVDs: Landing the Trout of Your Life and Weapons of Bass Production, both of which also feature John Barr, and his new film, Mastering the Short Game.



Together with his wife Michelle (who shares his passion for the sport) and their four children, Landon continues to live near his home waters of the South Platte River in Colorado where he teaches fly fishing through guiding and fly fishing classes; he also appears around the country giving presentations of his innovative, successful and popular techniques. FISHING REPORT: FALL UTAH OUTING

The final Utah trip was scheduled for October 12, with Roger Knudsen, Kevin Larsen, Mike Woll, his 2 friends Ty and Vic joining me. I was delegated to watch the Covid lockdown reports. As it was, the motel owner indicated that the area was open and relatively safe from Covid, so we all quickly packed and headed to the town of Panguitch.

Roger and Kevin first stopped to wet a line at Yankee Meadows, located just outside of Parowan. Both found some success picking up a few Brookie's and Rainbows to 17". One Brookie was landed that measured about 20" which was, or that lake a monster!

Late in the afternoon, both moved to Panguitch Lake to give the evening hatch a look see. They found rising fish everywhere, as it seemed to be a callibaetis/midge hatch occurring. Several large Rainbows to 22" were landed, fishing a midge or callibaetis pattern.

I met Kevin and Roger the next morning at Panguitch Lake, with Mike Woll, Ty and Vic in tow. There was a slight breeze blowing and sunny. Kevin with his pontoon boat and electric motor configuration had no trouble zipping across the lake, while Roger brought his kayak and followed Kevin across to the weed beds. The breeze denied me from getting to far out, so I concentrated on the inside weed beds where I found fish in July. Kevin said he landed about 25 and Roger half as many. I came up zip without a single grab.

Roger decided to head to Lee's Ferry, Arizona, while Kevin headed home the following day. I took the remaining 3 guys to Yankee Meadows Reservoir. Mike and Vic had to leave due to truck issues, while Ty and I stayed and fished. I picked up 3 Rainbows to 16" and 1 Brookie that measured 18". Ty landed a 14" Rainbow for his first time fly fishing!

The next day, I took the guys to Paragonah Reservoir, also known as Red Creek Reservoir. There was a callibaetis hatch occuring and the lake was alive with rising Tiger Trout. Ty and I fished in float tubes while Mike and Vic fished from the bank. We all landed Tigers of varying sizes using Black Wooly Buggers, Callibaetis patterns, and Rainbow Warrior midge patterns. Most of the fish were in the 14" to 16" range and looked fat and healthy.

We next went to Panguitch Lake, but found it blowing hard and white caps, so the day was a bust. We all went in our own directions. I went to explore above the town of Beaver in the Tushar Mountains. I came to Beaver Creek, a past favorite, and gave it try. I had only 1 fish rise to the fly. As it was, the stream was low and so no other fish was to be found. I suspect the bait guys have depleted the stream unfortunately.

Paragonah Reservoir was our next day choice, expecting the same success as before. Ty and Vic had left for home. Mike and I decided to give Paragonah another try. I landed 7 Tigers using Callibaetis emergers float tubing, while Mike fished off shore and landed 6 using black wooly buggers.

The last day, I was left to my own devices as Mike left for Salt Lake City to meet his son. My choice that day was back to Paragonah Reservoir for Tiger Trout. I arrived with only a few rises observed. Not to be discouraged, I kicked out dragging a Peacock Bugger. That was the hot ticket as I landed 7, the largest a 18" Tiger! I got several grabs and long line releases during the day. The wind eventually kicked up in the afternoon and forced me to kick a hasty retreat.

Though not as many fish to the net compared to June and July, it was still an enjoyable trip.

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the SPFF. Below is a description of the formation of the club from our website. From our website:

The genesis of the Sierra Pacific FlyFishers occurred in 1971 when Steve and Jeff Ellis, owners of the Fisherman's Spot, a general fishing tackle store in Van Nuys, California, conceived the idea of the need for, and viability of, a fly fishing club in the San Fernando Valley.

Store customers, some of whom were members of other fly fishing clubs and thus familiar with issues that seem to confront all non-profit volunteer organizations including funding, board development, and committee structure were consulted. Customers included Jordan Lagman, whose input on the future club's purpose and goals was both timely and valuable and J. Stanley Lloyd, an ardent conservationist and long-time fly fisher who was active in other clubs as well as being an officer in the Federation of Fly Fishermen, later renamed Federation of Fly Fishers.

Two organizational meetings were hosted by the Ellis Brothers at the Fisherman's Spot in late January and February of 1971. Subsequently, the first general meeting was held at the Van Nuys/Sherman Oaks Recreation Center club room in March. At the time, Lagman was elected Founding President. Other officers included John Crisp, Ty Estridge, Mike Silverman, Fred Lawson, Bennett Mintz and Steve

Ellis. The Fisherman's Spot volunteered to serve as

the club's mailing address.

Almost immediately, the club began its community service and education with free fly-tying classes taught by Lagman, plus various clean-up and conservation projects, family picnics and activities.
