"People go to Henry's Fork because of its hallowed waters. It's legendary – known as a technical river with big fish, and famous for its hatches." If you're a trout fisherman, you need to make the pilgrimage to the Henry's Fork. Our November presenter Karlie Rowland is one of the most requested guides on this famous stretch of water. She will guide us through the seasons and hatches of a river that has become

Over the years, Karlie has traveled from the Rockies to the Pacific northwest to Patagonia as part of her ongoing search for trout, salmon and steelhead. A tireless advocate for fisheries conservation and watershed protection, a passionate angler and educator, and a guide with extensive experience leading fly- fishing schools and hosted travel, she now works for TroutHunter on the river that started it all - the Henry's Fork. Karlie is on the Hardy Rods & Reels pro staff.

I also have heard from a few of you about programs you would like to see in the future, and different educational opportunities.



CASTING CORNER



Answer to last month's question: That one simple thing you can do? Regularly cleaning your fly line! You'll be amazed at the difference that a simple line cleaning will make in your casting. It does not have to be a completely thorough cleaning using a commercial line cleaner. Just wiping the line down with a damp rag will help. Some people carry small restaurant-supplied "towelettes" (the kind they give you at BBQ restaurants) and use these to wipe the line down regularly (they take up very little room in your vest or pack). But for a really clean line, you can strip the line off into a bucket with warm water and dilute mild soap, let it soak, and then rinse it in a separate bucket or even with a wet towel as you wind it back on. For further smoothness, you can even wipe down the line with a micro-abrasive cloth such as Rio's Wonder Cloth or Scientific Anglers line cleaning pad, or the pad that comes with the Orvis Zip Juice cleaner. You can even treat the line with a proprietary line-cleaning product such as Orvis's Zip Juice or Rio's AgentX fly line dressing (only for floating line). See this YouTube video for a very thorough, three-step approach to a more thorough cleaning: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=QsCDjSdrpOA I would avoid products made for the auto industry (such as some Armor All and Turtle Wax products). They can impart incredible slickness and add yards to your casts, and I have used them myself in the past with great success (specifically the Turtle Wax "Quick and Easy Inside Out Protectant"). But there's always a slight danger using any product that is not specifically made for fly lines (they can change the formula without telling us, and some of these petroleum-based products could damage fly line), and I think it's worth the extra cost to make sure the product you're using is made for fly lines. Not everyone will agree with me on this point.

This month's question: Your casts are reaching your target, more or less, but you find that the fly is landing a little too hard, slapping the water and making too large of a splash compared to what you would like it to do. What might you be doing on your cast that could cause this?

CASTING EVENTS AT FFI VIRTUAL EXPO NOV. 5-7

Hi everyone! By now I hope you are all registered for the upcoming **FFI Virtual Expo** (November 5-7)!

There are many casting-related presentations scheduled for the Expo, and you will want to check out all of the titles in advance to plan your days. Note that some sessions have a cost associated with them, whereas others are free with your registration for the Expo. I would particularly like to bring your attention to the following casting-related sessions:

CAST 01: A Review of North American Casting Styles: Keith Richard and Todd Heggested

Description: The pros and cons of four of the most applicable casting styles utilized by the majority of fly casters (tournament casting will be excluded) will be covered along with potential injuries casters should be mindful of avoiding. (\$25)

CAST 03: The Novice Caster's Guide to Loop Formation and Line Control: Tim Lawson

Description: Stop hoping for the next good cast and learn the casting mechanics that will ensure the formation of a loop that produces maximum distance and accuracy with the minimum of effort. Learn how to make the line go where you want it to go. (\$25)

CAST 04: Virtual Video Casting Analysis Using OnForm: Willy George

Description: This is a two session workshop on 11/05/2021 (Part A) and 11/7/2021 (Part B) from 3:00 to 5:00 PM ET both days. This casting workshop is designed for all casting skill levels and casting instructors. Students are asked (expected) to attend both days to benefit from the instruction (read on). On Friday, we will cover key elements of the casting stroke and introduce a video casting analysis tool called OnForm. Volunteers who want to have their casting form analyzed will take videos of their casts on Saturday using a free version of the OnForm app that the instructor will send them. Then on Sunday, the entire student group, including the volunteers, will listen to the feedback session with the Master Casting Instructor while watching the on-screen analysis of the casting videos using the OnForm app. This workshop will teach you multiple ways to improve your casting technique through video casting analysis including self-improvement, virtual remote learning, and face-to-face casting lessons.(\$50 for both sessions)

CAST 11: Trout Spey – A Wonderful New Dimension for Casting and Fishing to Trout: Bruce Williams and Whitney Gould

Description: This program is designed for intermediate and above casters with some two-hand experience. We will present fishing situations and casting solutions to help you get your fly in front of fish which may rarely see a fly. (\$25)

CAST 13: Live Casting Demonstration Seminar, Teach the Teacher: Dok Arvanites and the Pasadena Casting Club

Description: Learning to teach is a lifelong process. If you are interested in improving your teaching skills, have a look. We will cover techniques and tips for teaching individuals and groups, as well as diagnostic and correction ideas, regardless of your teaching experience. (Free with registration)

CAST 06: Methods of Teaching Beginner Fly Casting: Walter Simbirski and Vince Brandon

Description: This program targets instructors, guides, and others who teach beginners the basic cast. We discuss general principles and look at a number of methods used to teach the basic fly cast. We discuss general principles and look at a number of methods used to teach the basic fly cast. (\$25)

CAST 10: How to Teach Fly Casting: Macauley Lord

Description: We will watch and discuss videos filmed in OnForm, a motion-analysis application, in which Macauley demonstrates -- for beginners -- the pickup-and-laydown, false casting, and roll casting. He includes tips on how and where to position yourself and your students, and some simple cures for common casting errors. (\$25)

CAST 14: Mend the Line for Catch Success: Molly Seminik and Heather Hodson

Description: Molly Semenik and Heather Hodson have put together a program that not only includes live discussions with Molly, Heather and the participants, but power point illustrations and recently shot video, on-thewater and in-the-air, as well. Drag free floats will be discussed along with some great supportive video. (\$25)

I would also like to extend a special invitation to my own session on the "Spirituality of Fly Fishing," an exploration into why we fly fish rather than how. This session is on Saturday, November 6, at 11:00 am our time, and it is also free:

FFS 20: The Spirituality of Fly Fishing: Jody Martin and Bruce Williams





Consideration for McKenzie Cup Award March 30, 2021

INTRODUCTION

Fifty years ago this year, the Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers (SPFF) was founded in Encino, California with the objective "to promote the sport of flyfishing and to conserve our fisheries." During these fifty years, SPFF has stayed true to its objectives, not even faltering due to the worldwide Covid-19 pandemic that erupted in March 2020. Indeed, faced with the inability to hold in-person meetings and programs last year, SPFF promptly focused on providing a panoply of virtual speakers, special programs and fly-tying on the internet, while making the necessary adjustments so that it could continue its traditional twice-monthly in-person free casting instruction in full compliance with all Covid-19 regulations. As a result of the focus, imagination and dedication of its members, SPFF was actually able to expand its overall activities during 2020, thereby continuing its tremendous success during recent years in the areas of casting, flytying, conservation, outreach, women's programs, wounded veterans, assistance to other clubs, and in particular support for FFI and its Southwest Council.

FFI INVOLVEMENT

Southwest Council of FFI. With 23 clubs, the Southwest Council is tied with Texas as the largest Councils of the FFI. Of the 23 clubs in the Southwest Council, none has been more actively involved at the Council level in recent years than SPFF. Two of the three most recent past presidents of the Southwest Council were active members of SPFF (Bill O'Kelly and Michael Schweit), and the current president of the Southwest Council (Leigh Ann Swanson) has a dual membership with SPFF and Pasadena Casting Club. Eight other current directors of the Southwest Council are members of SPFF: Susi Wright (Secretary), Jody Martin (Casting), Debbie Sharpton (Conservation Director), Steve Fernandez (Fly Tying), Catrina White (Women's Programs), Joe Radocchio (Education), Cece Rubin (Communications Chair), and Michael Schweit (Special Programs).

SPFF and its members appreciate the importance of the FFI and the Southwest Council and actively promote both. The front page of the SPFF website contains a link to the Southwest Council newsletters, and their activities and programs also are highlighted in the SPFF monthly newsletter as well as email "blasts" to all SPFF members for special Southwest Council events.

FFI CI Certification Program. SPFF has been a staunch promoter of the FFI CI certification program. In October of 2020, an interactive seminar titled "The FFI Casting Instructor Certification Program: What is it and how can it help me?" was created by SPFF under Jody Martin and offered via Zoom to members of all 23 clubs in the Southwest Council. SPFF also submitted needed edits to the CI Study Guide and to the CI Exam, as well as creating and providing a list of more than 200 practice questions – the first of its kind – for CI students studying for the written part of the CI Exam.

Other. SPFF members have provided substantial support for the Southwest Council's annual FlyBuy (its major fundraising event), and for the Southwest Council's participation in the five-day Fred Hall Show (which was not held in 2020).

INVOLVEMENT WITH OTHER CLUBS

Southern California Speaker Circuit. SPFF has played a key role in the continuation of the Southern California Speaker Circuit. The circuit consists of seven southern California fly fishing clubs, who pool their resources to provide presenters for the clubs eight months a year. The circuit has gained an international reputation for the quality and diversity of the speakers, who have included legends of the industry such as Gary Borger, the late Lefty Kreh, Mel Krieger and Charles Jardine as well as the new generation of George Daniel, Devin Olsen and Karlie Roland. Presenters are given a rental car, meals allowance and their standard speaking fee, and the tour lasts ten days. A tour itinerary guides them through the intricacies of Sothern California traffic. The speakers enjoy a weekend break when they can conduct seminars, fly tying or casting sessions, or enjoy the local fishing in the Eastern Sierra. Presenters are contracted at least a year in advance to speak at the seven Clubs within the greater Los Angeles area from Ventura to San Diego.

Since late 2017, the Southern California Speaker Circuit has been managed by Programs Chair and SPFF member Marshall Bissett, assisted by SPFF co-member Leigh Ann Swanson. These two persons book the presenters and take care of every detail from travel arrangements to assistance with program presentation. The standard of production has been set very high and the programs are central to each club's monthly meeting.

Other. As previously mentioned with respect to FFI Involvement, in 2020 SPFF created an interactive seminar titled "The FFI Casting Instructor Certification Program: What is it and how can it help me?" that was offered via Zoom to members of all 23 clubs in the Southwest Council.

SPFF also has offered joint programs with other local clubs from time to time, and its members participate in the annual Owens River cleanup.

PROMOTING THE SPORT OF FLY FISHING

SPFF, through its meetings and speakers (whether live or virtual), which are open to all, casting and fly-tying instruction for both members and non-members, and participation in Project Healing Waters, fosters interest in fly fishing. Two programs, however, are specifically tailored for promoting the sport of fly fishing: the annual SPFF Introduction to Fly Fishing course and the Getting Started Outing. In addition, SPFF expanded its social media presence in 2020, which now is flourishing.

SPFF Introduction to Fly Fishing Course. The Introduction to Fly Fishing (ITFF) course has been refined over the past twenty years. The sessions take place over several weeks followed by an optional graduation weekend in the Eastern Sierra that includes a dinner and presentation of certificates. The sessions, run by four FFI Cl's with the help of trained Club volunteers, ties casting instruction to fishing methods. Casts include the pickup and lay down, the false cast and the roll cast. The classes take place on consecutive Saturday mornings with casting on Reseda Pond and classroom sessions in the nearby One Generation building. Younger students have their own class with their peer group. Knot tying, reading the river, equipment advice and river etiquette are topics covered in the comprehensive manual given to each student. The Club charges adults \$40 for the full course and kids under 18 are free; this includes Sierra Pacific

Membership, normally a \$65 annual fee. As a bonus, loaner rods are provided to students. The classroom sessions feature expert hands-on knot tying, an introduction to entomology and a detailed Q&A period. SPPF is justifiably proud of the service this provides to its local San Fernando Valley and surrounding communities.

SPFF Getting Started Outing. Held in July each year, The Getting Started Outing (GSO) is SPFF's most popular event of the year. Based in Mammoth Lakes, CA, the club has a combination of small group trips led by experienced members to a whole variety of "secret" fishing spots. These range from streams in Yosemite National Park, Devils Postpile National Monument, a group backpacking trip, float tube excursions and multiple streams and rivers in the Mammoth Lakes area. Some instructional programs also are offered (for a small fee) led by professional guides for those wanting to learn Tenkara fishing, streamer fishing, Euro Nymphing, afternoon hopper fishing, or just where the best fishing is taking place. The GSO provides SPFF's Introduction to Fly Fishing students another opportunity to increase their skills and provide them a real variety of fishing activities.

Social Media. The SPFF Foundation Facebook page currently has 10 groups as well as a community page. Approximately half of the Facebook page followers are from outside the club and hail from 39 states and eight countries. The two most active groups on the SPFF Facebook page are Women's Programs and Fly Tying (each described below). Other groups on the Facebook page include Rod Building, where members discuss rod building techniques, Fish Stories, and a Trading Post.

SPFF's Instagram page is popular both with SPFF members and fly fishers around the world. The page mirrors content offered on SPFF's Facebook page.

CASTING INSTRUCTION

Casting arguably is the most important of the many skills required for fly fishing. As Joan Wulff once wrote:

"Here is one final thought on the importance of being good at fly casting. There are two areas of expertise that are deemed most important to fishing success, and fly fishers often argue about which is more important. The first is knowing where the fish lie [reading the water] and the second is being able to present the fly (presentation/ casting). My thought is if you don't know where the fish lie but can cast well enough to cover all of the water with finesse, you are likely to solve the mystery and catch fish. If you know where the fish lie but can neither reach them or in some way present the fly to them, you are not even in the game." Joan Wulff, Fly Casting Techniques (1987).

For many years, instructors from SPFF have played a critical role in a variety of casting clinics and classes offered through the club itself or through the Southwest Council. These instructional opportunities have included both Beginning and Intermediate Casting Clinics and "Teach the Teachers" classes sponsored by the Southwest Council, as well as the annual SPFF "Introduction to Fly Fishing" class, SPFF's famous GSO (Getting Started Outing) each summer, nymphing clinics in the fall, and various other opportunities for learning how to cast a fly rod. Although other clubs nearly ceased their casting events during the pandemic of 2020, SPFF used

masks, social distancing, and other precautions, all in compliance with state and local medical regulations, to continue their casting clinics held twice monthly. On the first and third Saturday morning of every month, SPFF instructors gather at 27-acre Lake Balboa (in Anthony C. Bielenson Park, Encino, California to offer advice and instruction to anyone who attends, whether or not a member of SPFF. Attendance generally averages 12-15 participants each Saturday clinic. Additional private casting lessons are offered free of charge to anyone asking for more help.

As previously mentioned, in October of 2020 an interactive seminar titled "The FFI Casting Instructor Certification Program: What is it and how can it help me?" was created by SPFF and offered via Zoom to members of all 23 clubs in the Southwest Council.

SPFF also provides casting instruction to veterans participating in its local Project Healing Waters chapter (described below).

FLY TYING

<u>Fly Tying Class</u>. SPFF presents a 6 week fly tying class for beginning tiers each spring. The classes are open to members and non-members alike. Each student has a skilled club member as personal instructor and coach for the course. Our graduates usually will join our fly tying group sessions to learn additional tying techniques and create more complex flies.

<u>Fly Tying Group</u>. The group, which includes both members and non-members, meets weekly throughout the year for a fly tying session with one of the group teaching a fly pattern. Members alternate being the "teacher." SPFF also brings in top tiers from other clubs and the fly fishing community to come and teach.

Fly Tying and COVID-19. The Covid-19 pandemic struck right after the conclusion of SPFF's 2020 beginner's fly tying classes, forcing SPFF to halt the fly tying group's in-person fly tying sessions. SPFF was concerned that its recent graduates wouldn't have a chance to continue learning, so less than a month after Californians were ordered to shelter-in-place a weekly SPFF's Michael Peratis organized a Zoom fly tying class. The weekly Zoom meetings were advertised to the other clubs of the Southwest Council as well as on the public SPFF Facebook page. What started out as an experiment with a small group has grown to **over 110** participants in less than a year, with 20 to 30 persons typically in attendance at any given meeting. All participants receive an advance schedule of the flies to be tied and the materials needed. The local fly shop, Fishermen's Spot, receives a copy of the schedules and tries to have the required materials on hand. The programs are recorded and posted on the SPFF Facebook page for anyone who missed the program.

<u>Community Outreach</u>. SPFF members volunteer teaching fly tying (as well as casting) to military veterans at Project Healing Waters and actively volunteer for local Casting for Recovery programs.

WOMEN'S ACTIVITIES

In recent years, SPFF has made a concerted effort to reach out to women in the fly fishing community as well as to women who have an interest in becoming fly fishers. SPFF's

Women's Programs, under the leadership of Catrina White, offers support and friendship as well as outstanding programs specifically tailored for women. SPFF utilizes two primary methods to accomplish this: programs designed by and for women, and SPFF's Facebook group page, Women of the Sierra Pacific.

<u>Programs for Women</u>. Numerous women's programs have been organized and presented by SPFF. All programs offered during the pandemic have been provided online. Two such programs offered last year were The Marvelous Mavens of Fly Fishing, in which three award-winning female panelists (Mary Ann Dozer, Molly Seminik and Leigh Ann Swanson) shared their fly fishing journey, including the steps they took to develop their flyfishing skills; and An Evening With Fanny Krieger, in which Fanny discussed the establishment of the International Women Fishers and shared thoughts about recruiting women and families in the sport of fly fishing.

SPFF also provided a series of pre-recorded events with women fly fishing industry business owners and women fly fishing clubs. Speakers included April Archer, who spoke of her business, SaraBella Fly Fishing, how it was founded, and the veterans she hires to build custom rods and flies for sale; and Laurie Lane of Trout and Company, who spoke of her business in Montana and her educational gifts for children and clothing designed for women.

<u>Facebook</u>. SPFF has an active Facebook group page specifically for women that connects women from around the world. The group is open to all who identify as female – not to exclude men, but rather to provide a safe, supportive environment for women to learn, have fun, fish, tie flies, and share their stories as women in one great sport. The Facebook group acts like a community bulletin board, posting not only women's programs produced by SPFF but also events from FFI Women Connect and other women's groups. Topics on this page include posts from smaller clubs across the nation as well as international groups and posts from individuals asking for advice about travel, gear and fly choices.

YOUTH

Scholarship Program. SPFF considers it important to inculcate an interest in and love for fly fishing in our youth. Each year SPFF offers one or more scholarships to high school seniors who have selected a college major that supports environmental sciences, wildlife aquatics, wildlife biology or other major related to SPFF values of fishing and recreating in a healthy environment.. In 2020, two scholarships were granted, one to a girl who hopes to become an environmental analyst or researcher and one to a boy who wants to do "something in fisheries and wildlife." One former scholarship winner wrote the following to SPFF in October of 2020:

Hello there,

I, Kate, received a college scholarship from your organization in 2009. I went to UC Berkeley and majored in Environmental Science specifically studying human-environmental interactions. Since college, I have worked as an outdoor educator and guide, sharing the outdoors with people of all ages and hoping to help them grow a passion for protecting our outdoor resources. I now live in Truckee, CA close to Lake Tahoe. In my free time, I enjoy mountain biking, backpacking, skiing, and of course fishing.

I hope this email finds you well and thank you again for supporting my education.

Casting. SPFF's Introduction to Fly Fishing course is offered free to kids under 18.

<u>Program on the Next Generation</u>. In 2020, SPFF offered a Zoom program on Fly Fishing: The Next Generation, in which three generations of fly fishers spoke about recruiting children into fly fishing, how to teach them and pass along the knowledge that has been learned to the generations to come. The youngest participant, 10-year-old Deighan Cherry, spoke about her experience facing male classmates who told her that girls don't fish. Ignoring them, she formed a club called Fly Girl Global which teaches the principles of 50/50 on the Water and encouraged her friends to join her for fly fishing and fly tying.

<u>Outward Bound Adventures</u>. SPFF also has supported the local Outward Bound Adventures (which is affiliated with the Southwest Council) both financially and with person-power.

CONSERVATION

SPFF supports conservation efforts by including speakers on conservation topics periodically at its monthly meetings (such as Jim Cox from Western River Conservancy), regularly publishing or reprinting articles on conservation topics in its newsletter, providing email "blasts" to encourage input by members on legislation or regulations impacting conservation or fly fishing, and providing financial assistance to selected conservation organizations or projects.

Demonstrating its strong commitment to conservation, SPFF's second most prestigious award that it grants is the *Order of the Jassid*, which is granted for extraordinary contribution to conservation. Past recipients include Bob Baiocchi (FFF Hall of Famer), Ardis Walker, and SPFF's own Debbie Sharpton (now conservation chair for Southwest Council).

OUTREACH TO VETERANS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS: PROJECT HEALING WATERS

Veterans, especially those who come back from the front lines have very specialized issues that many non-veterans don't understand. SPFF has sponsored a local program of Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing, Inc. since 2007 under the outstanding leadership of David Hoffberg. Project Healing Waters is well known to FFI and is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active military personnel and disabled veterans through fly fishing. Project Healing Waters veterans suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), brain injuries, limited mobility, and blindness. The veterans have served in The Vietnam War, and most recently, Desert Storm. Several women who served as WAACs are very active in the SPFF's local program as well.

Classes are held twice a month (except during the current pandemic) at local VA facilities. There generally are approximately 15 veterans and six SPFF volunteers at each meeting. Meetings include classes on casting, fly pattern tying and fly rod building as well as viewing fly fishing videos. The fly tying classes are taught by SPFF members experienced at teaching fly tying. All tools and materials are provided to the veterans. Those with coordination difficulties are further supported by volunteers and those in their cohort.

The local program assists veterans who are interested in competition casting and rod building. One veteran in the program has won two awards in rod building and competition casting, and is hoping to continue with both activities when it is safe to meet in person again.

The local program also offers fly fishing retreats during the course of the year. All of the veterans' expenses for the retreats are paid, including transportation, lodging, fishing guides and meals.

Due to COVID, the local Project Healing Waters program has not been meeting in person, which created a serious barrier to the veterans' mental and physical health. Several volunteers stepped up during this time by reaching out to the veterans with regular phone calls. In addition, SPFF created a private Facebook group where the veterans are alerted to the many programs offered virtually and can find resources and activities during this trying time.

EDUCATION

Generally. Education permeates much of what SPFF does that has already been discussed, such as the speakers at its monthly meetings, articles in its monthly newsletter, fly casting and fly tying programs and events, women's and other special programs, and Project Healing Waters. SPFF's educational opportunities for members and non-members have been rapidly expanding in recent years and particularly 2020, notwithstanding the Covid pandemic. Educational outings not previously mentioned include:

<u>Surf Fishing.</u> During the winter SPFF seeks to provide monthly surf fishing outings to local beaches. Many involve educational experience for novices as well as others who just want to get out of the house and try a new activity.

Nymphing Clinic. This annual event (other than 2020) is held in the fall in Bishop, CA, and is designed for those wanting to improve their nymph fishing skills and those wanting to learn Euro Nymphing. Experienced club members take out small groups and fish various nearby areas.

CONCLUSION

Back in 1964, Lee Wulff wrote to Bob Wethern: "It occurs to me that a loose federation of fly fishing groups could be of considerable value." Out of this idea shared by Lee and others emerged FFI. Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers and its members share this idea today, strongly supporting the FFI and providing significant leadership and person-power to the Southwest Council. At the same time, the club has exemplified FFI's Mission Pillars of Conservation, Education, Community. When the pandemic grounded so many normal activities for all clubs, Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers rose to the occasion and not only maintained but expanded its overall activities.

For the Sierra Pacific Fly Fishers, fly fishing is a passion, a passion to be shared with others and its environs protected.
